Position purpose

The advertised position is located within the School of Languages, Literatures, Cultures and Linguistics, one of the largest schools in the Faculty of Arts. Its members conduct research in the disciplines of literary and cultural studies, linguistics and applied linguistics, history and the social sciences, as well as in several interdisciplinary fields. The school's program's offer studies at undergraduate, honours and postgraduate levels. A variety of exchanges, in-country programs and short courses are available to students. The school has a wide network of international connections, engages in international research projects, and is involved in collaborative teaching with partner universities abroad.

French Studies at Monash is a vibrant, research-driven community of undergraduates, postgraduates and lecturing staff with a reputation for pedagogical innovation.

Staff in the French program bring a broad range of specializations to their teaching and research, including literature, film, linguistics, language pedagogy, intercultural communication, society, politics and philosophy, working collaboratively to offer Monash students a cross-disciplinary French studies program with an emphasis on research-led teaching and pedagogical excellence.

French Studies is one of the largest programs in the school, with students at all levels from *ab initio* to CEFR C1+. Students completing a major in French can choose from a suite of elective units which focus on discipline specializations (film, literature, thought, society) with a view to honours and postgraduate study.

Key responsibilities

The appointee will be expected to:

- 1. Provide academic leadership in the activities of the program and the school at all campuses on which French Studies is represented, particularly in teaching, research, research training and research supervision
- 2. Increase the profile of the program, and the school, nationally and internationally, by:
 - enhancing the standing of their research and research training activities
 - achieving successful research outcomes
 - participating prominently in, and initiating, international collaboration in research
 - obtaining national and/or international competitive grants for research activities and securing other sources of research revenue
- 3. Enhance the quality of the teaching and learning activities of the program and the school
- 4. Identify and act upon opportunities for advancing the discipline of French Studies
- 5. Ensure effective interaction between the program and the school and other parts of the faculty and University, particularly in relation to cooperative research activities
- 6. Participate actively in the school's policy-making and management structure
- 7. Provision of a continuing high level of teaching and research achievement in a scholarly area (or areas) related to the discipline
- 8. Fostering the research of other groups and individuals within the organisational unit
- 9. Playing a leadership role in the development of curriculum areas within the discipline
- 10. Championing French Studies in the school, faculty and University
- 11. Supervision of honours and postgraduate research projects
- 12. Developing policy and being actively involved in administrative and educational matters within the organisational unit and within the university
- 13. Participating in and providing leadership in community affairs, particularly those related to the discipline, in professional, commercial and industrial sectors where appropriate

- 7. Ability to mentor junior colleagues and researchers, including mentoring of grant applicants
